



## **Move Like A Horse**


Horses are capable of distinct movements, or gaits. Each gait has a different order of footfalls (when each foot is in contact with the ground). The three basic gaits are walk, trot, and canter (or lope). In the diagrams below, the lighter colored horseshoes represent the foot/feet that is/are off the ground.


## Walk


The **walk** is a four beat gait, meaning that each leg moves independently. The walk is the slowest gait.
















## **Trot**

The **trot** is a two beat gait, with diagonal pairs of legs (right front and left hind, left front and right hind) moving together. The trot is faster than the walk.








## **Canter/Lope**

The **canter**, or **lope**, is a three beat gait. The horse pushes off the ground with the left hind leg, for example, then the right hind and left front move together, and then the right front (right lead). There is a moment of suspension when all four feet are off the ground before the next step starts.
